Tips for a Safe & Energy Efficient Holiday Season

At this time of year in Southern California, many of us are just as likely to see a Santa surfing in the sun as we are to see moonlight glistening on icicles. Holiday lights and decorations are a festive way to get into the spirit of the season even without the snow.

The City of Moreno Valley, Southern California Edison, Southern California Gas Company, and the Community Energy Partnership* encourage you to take a few minutes to check your holiday lights and decorations for safety and offer tips to help you save energy during the holidays.

The 10-Minute Holiday Lights Safety Test

Take a close look at your holiday lights, cords, and power strips, and the outlets they're plugged into, with these questions in mind:

- Are all electrical cords and light strands in good condition? If not, throw them away.
- Are your outlets, extension cords or surge protectors overloaded? Usage should never exceed recommended wattage.
- Are all lights and cords approved by Underwriters Laboratories? UL is an independent, nonprofit organization that tests electrical components and equipment for potential hazards, and the UL mark on products that have been tested, verified and inspected for safety.
- Are all wires free of puncture by staples, tacks or nails? If you need to hang wires or cords, the safe way is to loop a plastic zip tie around the light strand, and secure the zip tie to the wall.
- Can you easily shut off the lights before leaving home? Leaving lights on can present an unnecessary fire hazard.
